Volunteering in Tweed Shire

The voluntary work sector is an important part of Australia's economy. The level of volunteering can indicate the cohesiveness of the community and how readily individuals are able to contribute to that community.

Tweed Council's Division of Community and Natural Resources engages and supervises over **716** volunteers on a wide range of projects. It is important to note that the professional support and supervision of volunteers requires a commitment of time and resources for Council staff to ensure that the experience, duty of care, and outcomes through the engagement of volunteers is a rewarding experience for the volunteers, staff and community. The hours of volunteering provide an equivalent economic contribution to the community, however this needs to be balanced against the time and resources for their support.


Halloween Flash Mob Zombie Walk – Tuesday 31 October 2017

Murwillumbah Zombies at the end of their town walk, outside TSC Chambers in Tumbulgum Road.



Volunteers Survey responses


A survey of current volunteers in the Division of Community and Natural Resources is being conducted. During a two week period 115 volunteers responded. Responses to the questions are summarised below.




How long have you been volunteering for Tweed Shire Council?



How many hours per week on average do you volunteer for Tweed Shire Council?




At which Council Service/s do you volunteer? (You can tick more than one box)




How did you find out about volunteering opportunities at Tweed Shire Council?



What motivates you most to be involved in volunteering? (Please tick only ONE box)




How likely are you to recommend volunteering with Tweed Shire Council to your friends and family?




How can Tweed Shire Council best improve your volunteer experience?



Are there barriers or reasons that make it difficult for you to volunteer more frequently? (You can tick more than one box)




What sort of volunteering arrangement best suits you? (Please tick only ONE box)
