

Work ramping up at Tweed Heads Museum

Work to preserve heritage buildings forming the Tweed Regional Museum precinct at Tweed Heads is about to achieve another milestone.

Following construction of a new office and research centre and restoration of the original Tweed Heads Court House, completed in October last year, work will now shift to restoring the original point of entry into the building.

Museum Director Judy Kean said the next stage of this project involves removal of the old and deteriorating ramp entry from the front of the Court House and construction of a new version that is safe and meets accessibility requirements.

"This work will significantly enhance public access to the precinct and we'll be able to complete the work without interrupting our normal opening hours," Ms Kean said.

"Construction will commence on site on Monday 19 March and will be ongoing for two or three months."

Some earthmoving and site fencing will be involved, however public opening hours for the Court House building and Tweed Heads Historical Society research rooms will remain unchanged: Tuesday and Wednesday, and the fourth Sunday of each month 10am – 4pm.

"Visitors will need to access the Court House by an alternative pathway but there will be signage in place to provide directions," said Ms Kean.

Work is also moving ahead on the refurbishment and reinterpretation of Boyd's Shed, along with minor repairs to the interior and an upgrade of displays.

"We've undertaken a number of oral history and video interviews to supplement photographs and other information that was installed in the Shed when it was originally relocated," Ms Kean said.

"The buildings that make up the Museum precinct at Kennedy Drive offer a rare insight into the old Tweed Heads and its rich maritime and fishing past.

"The Museum's location on the shores of Terranora Inlet, adjacent to a public jetty in Pioneer Park, offers many opportunities for the public to appreciate this rich and continuing coast and river story."

This work is assisted by a Heritage Activation Grant received under the NSW Department of Environment and Heritage, Heritage Near Me program.

Catch-up with your community at Knox Park BBQ

Council will acknowledge the ongoing recovery from the floods associated with Cyclone Debbie with a community catch-up and free barbecue in Knox Park.

The event will be held from 3pm to 6pm on Thursday 29 March, one year on from the flood, and will include members of community organisations who provided and continue to provide assistance.

Tweed Shire Council Manager Community and Cultural Services Robyn Grigg said the gathering will be a casual event and open to everyone.

"We all have our own memories of what happened one year ago and for many members of our community the recovery is still ongoing," Ms Grigg said.

"The purpose of this event is to recognise and acknowledge that ongoing recovery and to show that we are here to provide support however we can.

"We are asking people to bring a blanket and gather together in an informal way with others who have some sense of shared experience."

Representatives from Council and the State Emergency Service will speak at the gathering and there will be some activities planned with children in mind facilitated by Thrive 2484 and other volunteers.

Council staff will also be on hand to hand out chocolate Easter eggs while the SES will be coordinating the free barbecue.

Last available lawn burial sites at Tweed Heads Cemetery are now available



The final plots available at Tweed Heads Cemetery have now been released.

The last block of land set aside for final resting places in Tweed Heads Cemetery has been released.

Tweed Heads Cemetery off Kirkwood Road has opened its last available lawn burial area, named Section 224 in line with historical naming practices.

Tweed Shire Council Asset Coordinator Peter Ganser said the generic name does not reflect the true nature of the well-presented site.

"The site is secluded and private, lined with mature trees on both sides and easily accessible by visitors," Mr Ganser said.

"The area has a protection fence placed along its length and has a number of water outlets to allow easy filling of vases when loved ones visit and leave floral tributes for the departed.

"We have also run in an all-weather road to the section to ensure easy access for hearses and safe walking access for visitors, which has also improved access to the general cemetery sites on the way to this new area."

The site has been levelled off by raising the western side more than two metres in the centre using large concrete blocks and undertaking comprehensive earth compacting works to stabilise the whole area ready to take dual depth burials of two

coffins per grave.

Cemetery Administrator John Stennett confirmed that he sold a site in the new area prior to completion to a family that found it appealing even in its uncompleted state.

"It's even better now and the community will be pleased with this addition to the interment choices at Tweed," Mr Stennett said.

Tweed Heads still has several hundred available sites scattered among the established areas and Council anticipates that the cemetery will remain open for burials at current rates for at least 10 to 15 years.

The site also has major opportunities for ash memorials and development of these sites will extend the active life of this cemetery site for well over 50 years.

The Tweed Valley Lawn Cemetery at Eviron is projected to provide for the burial needs of the Tweed community for up to 80 years.

TRAC supporting accessible, safe swimming for all

A new agreement between Tweed Shire Council and the peak life saving body in Australia will provide support for members of the community who face extra challenges when it comes to enjoying a swim.

The agreement between Council and the Royal Life Saving Society under their Swim and Survive program will cover the costs of ensuring students from Murwillumbah High School's Support Unit stay safe in the water.

With the support of the program students from the unit will be able to make regular visits to the Tweed Regional Aquatic Centre's (TRAC) facilities at Murwillumbah.

TRAC Aquatic Programs Supervisor Jeff Collier said the funding will support a group with a wide range of swimming abilities.

"The program will focus on water safety activities and stroke correction for the more able swimmers, with the immediate prospects of assisting swimmers that are attending the State School Swimming Championships in Sydney in April," Mr Collier said.

The funding means Keshav Biswas, a student from the unit, will

receive specialised coaching from TRAC staff ahead of his trip to Sydney next month.

Other students will benefit from having one-on-one monitoring to ensure their safety in the pool, while staff will also organise activity and movement programs for those who can follow on their own.

The Swim and Survive program aims to increase the swimming, water safety and lifesaving skills of all Australian children with the overall goal of reducing the number of drowning deaths.

It specifically targets those who have challenges that result in them missing out on water safety education programs offered to young people across the country as part of the regular school curriculum.

Teacher Pamela Mathews said the experience of participating in the program will benefit the students throughout their entire lives.

"The extra swimming instruction means our students will be more confident in the water and their general fitness and balance will improve," Ms Mathews said.

"Students will be more competent and confident to access swimming programs and activities once they have left school."

Making the road ahead safer for older drivers

Free workshops to make the road ahead less daunting for older drivers will be held across the Tweed in April.

The workshops are being delivered by Council's Road Safety Officer Alana Brooks, as part of the Local Government Road Safety Program, to give older drivers some safe driving tips and explain commonly misunderstood road rules and licensing laws.

The key to staying on the road as an older driver is self-regulation and awareness of the factors that can affect your ability to drive. Changes in health that come with ageing, such as vision impairment, dementia and increased reliance on medication can reduce your focus, road awareness and reaction times when you're behind the wheel.

However, by making good decisions older drivers can adjust their driving patterns to avoid situations where they feel unsafe. For example, they may choose not to drive at night, in poor weather or during peak times.

All drivers over the age of 75 years must pass a yearly medical check to continue driving. Drivers aged 85 years and over must pass an on-road driving assessment every two years to retain an unrestricted license or they can choose to get a modified license without undergoing a formal test.

The modified license allows them to drive only at certain times and for certain distances in their local area to do what they need to do, such as shop, attend medical appointments or community activities.

The workshops will cover:

- safe driving tips
- commonly misunderstood road rules
- vehicle safety
- pedestrian safety
- physical fitness and driving, and
- mobility alternatives.

On show at the museum

The work of a local artist which takes a personal and up-close look at the impact of the floods associated with Cyclone Debbie is one of the features of a new display at Tweed Regional Museum in Murwillumbah.

Heather Matthew's work, 'Preserved Memories', is part of a larger project underway to document stories of the Tweed's most recent flood.

Acquired from the exhibition Posts from the Big Flood, part of the Murwillumbah Art Trail in May 2017, Matthew's work is made of objects rescued from the flood waters which devastated her studio in South Murwillumbah in March/April last year.

Museum Director Judy Kean said while some may question why the Museum is adding artworks to its collection, those who view the work will understand.

"In this case the work consists entirely of objects – preserving jars and a box – from Heather's studio, as well as some actual flood water that inundated her equipment," Ms Kean said.

"'Preserved Memories' and Heather's willingness to work with us to tell her story goes to the heart of an experience shared by many."

The artist has recorded a video with Ms Kean talking about her work and her journey over the past year which will also become part of the Museum's collection.

'Preserved Memories' and Heather's most recent work, 'Silt', made using paper rescued from the flood waters in her studio, together with the video footage, will be displayed at the Museum as part of the Murwillumbah Art Trail (MAT18) in May.

Uki – earthworks, kerb and gutter and road reconstruction Kyogle Road, near Braeside Drive; and resealing, patching various locations Kyogle Road.
