A much loved local character has taken on the role of Ambassador for a new campaign aimed at protecting bushland wildlife.

Kooee Koala will lend a hand to the campaign with personal appearances over the next few weeks plus, a social media competition featuring a giant hound hamper valued at more than \$250 will be up for grabs.

The Good Bushland Neighbours campaign was launched on Neighbour Day in Pottsville, with dog walkers treated to fresh juices and barista-made coffee.

Council Senior Program Leader – Biodiversity Scott Hetherington said residents were asked to complete a short survey relating to dogs in local bushland reserves.

“We know this particular area is popular with dog walkers so we wanted to hear the thoughts and experiences of local bushland neighbours,” Mr Hetherington said.

“The results of this survey will help Tweed Shire Council understand how and why residents choose to use adjacent bushland reserves and to guide them in the ongoing management of this area.”

Council Bushland Officer John Turnbull said bushland reserves are high-conservation-value habitat for a number of threatened

species, including koalas and bush stone-curlews.

“While Council encourages residents to enjoy the many bushland reserves found in Tweed Shire, people need to recognise that accessing these ecologically sensitive areas also comes with responsibilities,” Mr Turnbull said.

“A key message to be delivered by the Good Bushland Neighbour campaign asks bushland users to respect all signage related to dogs as any increase in dog-related injuries could prove catastrophic to an already fragile Tweed Coast koala population.”

Condong preschool open day

A community preschool damaged by last year's flood will open the doors of its newly renovated home to the community this Friday to thank those who helped with the clean-up.

Possums Community Preschool in Condong, which has operated out of the Council-owned Condong Hall building for 32 years, was forced to move to Tumbulgum Primary School while major repairs to the building were carried out

The preschool, which provides services to 40 local families, was helped by what Teacher Michelle Acret said was a small army of volunteers during the clean-up from the flood.

“It was a very emotional experience to come back here where we belong, especially for the kids who are back in familiar surroundings,” Ms Acret said.

“We are so grateful to Tumbulgum Primary School for taking us in but there were some challenges around things like toilets and boundary fences, which means our staff are happy to be home as well.

“This is much more of a purpose-built facility now, much more spacious and open, and we are definitely better prepared for another flood.

“Out of what was a horrible event we can definitely say something beautiful has emerged.”

The building was fully restored for Possums' use following an assessment of damage by Council staff.

In addition to new flooring and walls, a significant amount of asbestos was removed from the structure while a new kitchen, office space and a storage loft were constructed.

The preschool at 20 McLeod Street will be open from 3pm to 5pm on Friday 6 April.

Live and local on in Kingscliff and Murwillumbah

Council has committed to giving the local music scene a boost by creating and supporting two upcoming events featuring local musicians.

In partnership with local venues, Council will promote the Musicians Connecting Communities or MC² festivals in Kingscliff on Saturday 28 April and in Murwillumbah on Saturday 19 May.

Both festivals will feature a line-up of local musicians playing in various venues on the day, with attendees invited to listen in and support local businesses.

The events are the result of a successful grant application made by Council to the Live Music Office's Live and Local Initiative, funded by CREATE NSW.

Council Community Development Officer Cultural Planning David Burgener said the festivals offer a chance for musicians to play in the shire and connect with local venues.

“One of the intentions of the festivals is to establish relationships between Council, musicians and venue owners,” Mr Burgener said.

“The idea is to help support live music in the shire by providing a family-friendly event the whole community can enjoy.

“These festivals will make use of hotels and clubs but also less traditional venues such as cafes and even a tattoo parlour.”

Another focus of the festivals will be an attempt to support the establishment of mentoring situations, especially for emerging artists just starting out on their musical careers.

Mr Burgener said Council hoped to organise a workshop associated with the festivals to support artists in understanding what was expected of them in a professional environment.

Beetlemania workshop

Tweed Shire Council and Tweed Landcare Inc. are offering a free workshop for graziers to refine their dung beetle identification and management skills.

Council's Program Leader – Sustainable Agriculture Eli Szandala said dung beetles play a critical role in any sustainable livestock production system.

Dr Bernard Doube, from Dung Beetle Solutions Australia, will provide participants with hands-on skills in beetle identification and monitoring techniques and the best advice on beetle-friendly chemical controls for livestock.

He will also speak about the latest on national initiatives to utilise dung beetles to increase farm productivity and profitability.

North Coast Local Land Services district veterinarian Dr Phil Kemsley will be on hand to discuss practical control strategies for buffalo fly and the role of dung beetles for managing animal health.

Southern Cross University researchers will present findings from a recent dung beetle survey project in the Tweed, which investigated dung beetle species distribution and the effects of various chemical controls on beetle populations.

A painter's house revisited at Gallery

The latest exhibition at the Margaret Olley Art Centre will feature works by contemporary artists inspired by the objects which surrounded her and became integral to her life's work.

The extraordinary collection of things that filled Margaret Olley's home studio at Duxford Street, Paddington, Sydney was the subject matter for her paintings for nearly 50 years.

The re-creation of this home studio, at the Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre, pays homage to the artist with over 21,000 objects meticulously arranged to reflect their placement in her Sydney home.

Margaret Olley Art Centre Curator Ingrid Hedgcock said the exhibition views these objects from a fresh perspective.

"For Olley, her home was first and foremost a studio – a painter's house," Ms Hedgcock said.

"While she worked, her studio changed like a vibrant living ecosystem of art and life entwined; in her words, it was 'a subject of endless possibilities'."

For the exhibition *A Painter's House* four contemporary painters were invited to respond to objects in Olley's home studio – working from the Gallery's Nancy Fairfax Artist in Residence Studio.

John Honeywill, Guy Maestri, Lewis Miller and Monica Rohan return to Olley's beloved collection, to explore, experiment, enliven, interpret and reveal. The results will be displayed alongside Olley's

own paintings in this exciting new exhibition.

The paintings by Olley include works from the Tweed Regional Gallery collection, the Art Gallery of New South Wales collection, Maitland Regional Gallery collection, the University of Queensland Art Museum and private collections.

A Painter's House opens in the Margaret Olley Art Centre on Saturday 31 March and runs until 7 October.

Solar expo good for the environment and the pocket

Tweed Shire Council will promote its Solar Buyers Guide at three upcoming solar and battery expo events across the Shire.

Avoiding wasted energy can save hundreds of dollars each year, so the events will highlight the simple steps everyone can take for big financial and environmental gains.

Council's Sustainability Program Leader Debbie Firestone said local solar suppliers and installers will also be at the event to promote the range of solar and battery technology and expertise available.

"Ask lots of questions, use local accredited suppliers, choose quality products and get systems designed to suit your needs," Ms Firestone said.

"Council has a Solar Buyers' Guide available on the Energy page of our website, and I'll be at the events to share the guide with those wanting to make an investment in solar at their place."

Electricity use in homes is a big cost for the household budget, and also has a significant environmental impact when that power comes from the grid.

A recent calculation of the basic greenhouse gas emissions from the Tweed showed nearly 28 per cent of Tweed's emissions are

associated with fossil fuel-sourced electricity use in homes.

"As more Tweed homes are joining the movement/making the move to rooftop solar and batteries to save money and save on carbon emissions, Council is encouraging buyers to make a smart investment," Ms Firestone said.

The first of the events, which are being presented by Enova Community Energy, is being hosted during Seniors Week, on Thursday 12 April in the Murwillumbah Civic Centre from 10am to 12pm.

Help will be on hand to read and understand electricity bills, so visitors are encouraged to bring their latest bill to the event.

Drop-in to check out flood modelling and mapping

Murwillumbah township residents and businesses have been invited to attend a Council drop-in session to learn some critically important lessons from the Murwillumbah CBD Flood Levee and Drainage Study.

The drop-in session will be held at the Canvas and Kettle Meeting Room at the Murwillumbah Civic and Cultural Centre from 3–6pm on Friday 6 April, where Catchment Simulations Solutions consultant David Tetley will present the results of the flood modelling and mapping he has undertaken in the area.

He'll also share the results of a survey of 800 residents of the area behind the main Murwillumbah levee, which found that very few people understand the flood risk in central Murwillumbah or would respond quickly to an order to evacuate.

"This flood modelling graphically illustrates the risk of flooding behind the levee wall, which every resident and business located in that area needs to be aware of and prepared for," Manager Roads and Stormwater Danny Rose said.

Community members will be able to talk with Council's flood engineers and the consultants to unpack some of the content of the draft Murwillumbah CBD Flood Levee and Drainage Study, which is on public exhibition until Friday 4 May 2018.

The draft study highlights the findings of the consultant's study and community survey and assesses a number of engineering options to further protect the area from floods.

Council has received funding for an additional study focused on South Murwillumbah, and will commence that work later in the year.

Allow extra time travelling on Tweed Valley Way

Motorists using Tweed Valley Way to get to Commonwealth Games events on the Gold Coast are advised to leave early on Wednesday and Thursday this week as there could be long delays at the roadworks on Tweed Valley Way at Tumbulgum during the early morning peak.

While Council will be employing extra traffic controllers to ensure the delays are kept to a minimum, motorists should leave 30 minutes earlier to accommodate any delay.

Delays could be between 10–20 minutes as the road pavement is being milled off and resealed between the Riverside Drive North and South exits, including the intersection of the North exit and Tweed Valley Way.

New line-markings will then move the stop line on Riverside Drive North exit further out on to Tweed Valley Way to improve visibility for motorists turning right out of Riverside Drive on to the

100kmh major arterial road. Currently, if a vehicle is travelling in the left-hand slip lane on Tweed Valley Way it can block from view any through-traffic on Tweed Valley Way.

After the section is resealed and line-marked, both northbound and southbound traffic will be directed to travel on the respective shoulders to provide a safe workzone for workers installing a centre wire rope median.

The section of road has a history of serious and fatal crashes and the work is being funded under the Federal Government's 2017–2018 Black Spot Program at a cost of \$1.3 million. The wire rope median will provide physical separation of the north and southbound traffic.

The Black Spot Program has to be completed by the end of June to comply with funding conditions, and time has already been lost to wet weather.
