Good news for Knox Park

Works has started in Murwillumbah's Knox Park to upgrade and widen the existing pathway and install new pathway lighting from the Nullum Street entrance through to the children's playground, as part of stage 2 works.

A new 2.5-metre shared pathway has been installed with additional park seating and an upgrade to the existing pole lights along this section of pathway.

The lighting is being funded by a grant from the Department of Family and Community Services - Social Housing Community Improvement Fund, while Council is paying for the pathway upgrade.

A new main switchboard will be installed to service the new lights and toilet block and to rationalise aged electrical services through the park. At the same time, the old toilet block next to Nullum House will be demolished. This will avoid the need to run a new power service to the block when it is earmarked for demolition, and also enable this entrance to the park to be tidied while the works are being undertaken.

The proposal to demolish the old toilet block is supported by the Murwillumbah Community Centre (MCC) who have offered the MCC amenities as an alternative until the new facility is completed. The public toilet next to the bus stop will also remain open until the new facility is completed.

It is anticipated that the installation of the new lights will commence this week with the public toilet to be demolished in the first week of July.

Hospital reference group members announced

The group has been established to assist Councillors in their deliberations on the site selection of the Tweed Valley Hospital and to explore alternative sites to the one currently nominated at Cudgen.

Award for community flood response

Tweed Shire Council has been recognised for its leadership in responding to the 2017 March flood event at the 2018 Local **Government Excellence Awards in Sydney.**

Council's Critical Incident Response Group won a Highly Commended award in the 'Special Project' category (population 60,000 and above), up against 16 other council projects from across the State.

The LG Professionals NSW awards highlight the exceptional achievements in local government across NSW and focus on significant areas of the industry including leadership, environment, community, operational performance, partnerships and more.

General Manager, Troy Green, said while the award went to Council, it was reflective of a whole-of-community response to the devastating event.

"This award is recognition not only of the work of Council staff and Councillors but also all the not-for profit and community organisations, the State Emergency Service, churches and individuals who worked tirelessly during and after the flood to help their community," Mr Green said.

"The outdoor workforce also deserves particular mention as these were the staff at the coal face who worked under trying and stressful conditions to clean up, repair and return essential infrastructure and services for the use of the community."

The Critical Incident Response Group managed the emergency response for Council, implemented business continuity plans for the inundated main depot staff and provided numerous additional services to support community residents and businesses at a time when many felt overwhelmed. The judges said:

"Tweed Shire Council's leadership in responding to the immediate flooding, the clean-up, repairing the damage left in Debbie's wake and preparing for future events has been wellplanned, executed and innovative. Many of the initiatives and learning arising out of the Tweed emergency could be implemented by other local government authorities in emergency situations."

The winner in the category was Wollongong City Council, while Georges River Council was also Highly Commended.

Makeover for Kingscliff's Lions Park before Christmas

Kingscliff's Lions Park is set for a makeover, to improve the functionality of the park while also improving accessibility and recreation facilities for residents and visitors.

The park – the foreshore area immediately south of the Cudgen Headland Surf Life Saving Club – is a much-loved gathering space for many. The refurbishment is designed to complement its current use around markets, surf events and community get-togethers.

The work is the next component of the Kingscliff Foreshore Revitalisation Project (KFRP), which included the establishment of Rowan Robinson Park, a seawall to protect from erosion and a major upgrade of the Kingscliff Beach Holiday Park.

Council's Manager Recreation Services, Stewart Brawley, said there were no changes of use of the park proposed or any major structural changes.

"Essentially we are replacing the old shelters and barbecues, improving accessibility through better connecting pathways, and generally dressing the park up," Mr Brawley said.


The old shelters will be replaced in a central location allowing for a larger, clear open space to accommodate these activities, with a second family barbeque facility installed at the southern end of the park.

The design will complement the Rowan Robinson Park upgrade with the same paving materials and park furniture carried through into the new design.

The plan was completed in consultation with the main park stakeholders/users – the surf club, the market operators and the Kingscliff Lions Club and also Council's Community Development Office – Ageing and Disability.

"While we would like to complete the full scope of works in the draft plan in one go, the extent of works to be undertaken in this stage will be dependent upon the funding available after the final payments for the contract works on Rowan Robinson Park and the community buildings are made." he said.

Unfortunately, two of the old Norfolk Pines in the park are in a state of serious decline resulting from previous root and trunk damage and will need to be removed.

"There is no likelihood of the trees recovering and they are presenting a risk of failure and possible injury," Mr Brawley said.

"These trees were originally planted by the Lions Club in the 1960s, and at the Lions Club's request, they will be replaced with the same species."

Research trip to uncover synergies in art and life

Margaret Olley Art Centre's Curator has been awarded a prestigiuous travel grant to France to research a friend and colleague of Margaret Olley, expatriate Australian painter, Fred Jessup.

Ingrid Hedgcock – who is also Collections Manager at Tweed Regional Gallery – has been awarded a 2018 Darling Travel Grant Global, by the Gordon Darling Foundation. This extraordinary and generous program provides arts professionals, in public institutions, with the opportunity to undertake international travel, for specific projects, that will deliver benefits for both the individual and the institution.

The Gordon Darling Foundation allocates the travel grants through an open and competitive selection procedure, with a limited number of grants available.

Ms Hedgcock secured a grant to travel to Paris and Espondeilhan in the south of France next month to continue her research on expatriate Australian painter Fred Jessup (1920–2007). The research will culminate in an exhibition at the Margaret Olley Art Centre regarding the lifelong friendship and creative connection between Margaret Olley and Fred Jessup.

The two painters, both of which dedicated themselves to the genre of still life in their later years, first met in Sydney in the early 1940s. They each travelled to Europe in the late 1940s spending time together in Paris and the south of France.

Olley returned to Australia in 1953 but Jessup was never to return to Australia permanently. Instead he moved Espondeilhan in the mid-1950s and enjoyed a career as a painter. He returned

to Australia on only a few occasions during which he would spend time with Olley painting along the Tweed coast as they travelled between Sydney and Brisbane.

"Olley and Jessup were dear, lifelong friends despite the geographical distance between them," Ms Hedgcock said.

"I had long been fascinated by the stories of friendship between Olley and Jessup. Then, about three years ago, I discovered that Jessup's home studio in Espondeilhan remained unchanged since his death in 2007."

"Coincidently, one of Jessup's dear friends, who once resided in Espondeilhan, now lives here in Murwillumbah. Her passion, matched by that of Jessup's family, to tell his story in Australia, has been a great source of inspiration for me to persevere with this project."

"I had seen photographs of Jessup's home studio that Olley

had taken when she visited him decades ago, so of course I was intrigued to see what remained," she said.

Photographs of Jessup's home studio, as it remains even today, revealed a startling synergy to Olley's home studio re-creation at the Tweed Regional Gallery.

"I felt it was vital to visit and document this space, before it is lost to decay. With research time there I will be able to focus in on the details of the space — looking through photograph albums and letters, for example, from Olley to Jessup," Ms Hedgecock said.

Another important aspect of this project is the involvement of renowned Australian photographer, Greg Weight.The Tweed Regional Gallery Foundation has provided funds to enable Weight to travel to Espondeilhan to photograph Jessup's home studio. Weight was a long-time friend of Olley's, photographing her in her home studio many times.

Personal trainer licenses from 2 July
Are you a personal trainer in Tweed Shire? If you're
training six or more people for a fee on public land, you
will need to obtain a license from Tweed Shire Council
from 2 July 2018.

Trainers with groups of five or less don't need to get a license but must still comply with operating guidelines. Public land includes parks, beaches, sports fields and other land managed by Council.

Fees are charged at:

- Annual fees from \$260 to \$520 pa depending on activity frequency.
- One-off weekly fee \$64.



Wild Dog/Fox Baiting Program

A 1080 wild dog/fox baiting program will commence in the Tweed Coast District on Monday 25 June 2018 through to Friday 21 December 2018. The program will be ongoing and possibly involve three rounds of baiting during this time. Further notifications will be placed in the Tweed Link prior to each round of 1080 baiting.

The program will be conducted on rural properties in the vicinity of Hastings Point, Pottsville, Round Mountain and Cudgera Creek, specifically on Round Mountain Road, Round Mountain; Towners Road, Round Mountain; Cudgera Creek Road, Cudgera Creek and Round Mountain Road, Hastings Point. This action is necessary due to continued surveillance showing wild dog/fox activity in the area.

Please ensure all pets, particularly dogs, are kept restrained during this period

Uki – earthworks, kerb and gutter and road reconstruction Blackspot Programme Kyogle Road, between Glenock Road and Gold Gully; and resealing, patching various locations Kyogle Road.

Maintenance South - Numinbah and Kyogle roads, Tweed Valley Way.

Maintenance North - Fraser Drive, Cabarita and Pottsville areas.
