## Bridge on track for Xmas traffic

The Kingscliff Bridge upgrade has reached an important milestone with the completion of works below water level which means the project is no longer subject to Cudgen Creek's tidal variations.

Despite some challenges in the drilling process and the construction of the piles, the works are progressing well and the bridge remains on track to be trafficable by Christmas.

"We are currently completing the sub-structure work which means we'll be able to progress to the main deck in a few weeks and people will be able to see the new bridge really take shape," Construction Engineer Nigel Dobson said.

"This week we're completing steel work on the northern abutment, formwork on the southern abutment and preparing for the centre headstock, once the concrete in these abutments and the centre head stock has cured and gained sufficient strength, we can then crane in the girders that create the main structural element of the bridge deck."

**Progress on the Kingscliff Bridge main deck will begin in a few weeks once the sub-structure work has been completed.**

# Beautiful butterflies bring deeper message

Some of the most beautiful butterflies from Australia, Asia and South America will be featured at Tweed Regional Museum Murwillumbah when Greg Newland is the next collector to be showcased in the Museum's Collector's Cabinet display.

Twelve cases of colourful butterflies will be on display from Tuesday 27 September until February 2017.

"I first became interested in butterflies when I was in primary school, and by chance. I hung out for a while with the wrong crowd – the rough boys who fought, swore and spat on the ground to show everyone how tough they were," Greg said.

"As it happened, a couple of them collected butterflies."

Collecting butterflies soon became what Greg did to "make your own fun" – a requisite of his childhood in Murwillumbah – and his boyhood pursuit was soon supported by his father and grandfather.

"To catch the butterflies, I used a collecting net which my father helped me put together," he said.

"I stored my first butterflies in discarded shirt boxes, much to the delight of the carpet beetles and cockroaches which set up residence in my room and devoured most of my precious specimens. I then acquired an old insect storage box which belonged to my grandfather; it helped to keep out the pests."

Today, Greg's interest in collecting is sustained by the environmental messages his collection represents. Butterfly numbers have declined over the decades since Greg first started collecting and the biggest threat to their future survival in the Northern Rivers is loss of habitat caused by activities such as land clearing.

While habitat loss can be alleviated by growing plant species that butterflies rely on, they are also threatened by exotic weed invasion and excessive use of pesticides. Butterflies are an important part of the natural ecosystem and perform many roles, including pollination.

Tweed Regional Museum's Acting Director Kate Gahan said it was thrilling to display Greg's collection in the Museum.

"The vibrant and diverse patterns of the butterflies are the elements that first draw you to look at the display.

The careful arrangement of the butterflies in their wooden cases demonstrates Greg's dedication to his collection," Ms Gahan said.

Greg will speak at the Museum on Saturday 8 October at 11am about his journey collecting butterflies and the stories the exhibit reveals.

## WILD DOG CONTROL (1080 BAIT)

The NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service is advising all neighbours of Cudgen Nature Reserve of wild dog monitoring and 1080 wild dog baiting in the following areas to be undertaken within the reserve.

The monitoring and required control programs will be carried out between 10 October and 31 December, 2016.

These works will be undertaken in accordance with the North Coast Local Land Services Wild Dog Management Plan and NPWS Northern Rivers Region Regional Pest Management Strategy.

Landholders are encouraged to participate in control programs on private property and should contact NSW Local Land Services to discuss and arrange programs.

**Please note:** People should be aware of the baiting programs and avoid bait stations in all areas, at all times. Signs will be located in areas where baits have been laid indicating the date baits were placed.

Delays may occur due to unsuitable weather conditions and associated restricted access. Additional programs may be undertaken following initial programs depending on wild dog activity.

## Have your say on river management

**Public feedback on the management of the Tweed River is invited through a community survey being launched this week.**

The questionnaire, being conducted by independent survey consultant Jetty Research, is part of community engagement to help produce a Tweed River Estuary Coastal Management Plan. Visit [yoursaytweed.com.au/tweed-river-estuary](http://yoursaytweed.com.au/tweed-river-estuary) for a link to the online survey, while printed copies are available at Council's Murwillumbah and Tweed offices and the libraries.

"We want to know how people use the river and its surrounds and what they value about the Tweed River Estuary," Council's Director of Community and Natural Resources, Tracey Stinson, said.

"What do they think of the river's health and what do they think of the various practices to manage it."

Jetty Research last month conducted a phone survey of randomly selected residents to get a statistically representative sample of community views for the management plan.

"The community survey replicates the questions in that phone survey, so everyone now has the chance to give their feedback on the use and preservation of our iconic Tweed River," Ms Stinson said.

# Rare insights with tour and dinner at the Gallery

Rare insight into the life of cherished Australian painter Margaret Olley will be served up at an exclusive tour and dinner at the Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre on Saturday 29 October.

Filmmaker and journalist Meg Stewart, who wrote the award-winning biography *Margaret Olley: far from a still life*, will lead a tour of the Margaret Olley Art Centre (MOAC) and its current exhibition, Margaret Olley: from the collection.

"Meg will share fascinating stories about the time she spent in Olley's Duxford Street home studio in Sydney, interviewing Olley for the biography," MOAC Curator and Collections Manager Ingrid Hedgcock said.

"Gain a new perspective of MOAC's home studio re-creation by hearing first-hand accounts from a skilled storyteller."

*Margaret Olley: far from a still life* has been described as a biography that is comprehensive but also a warmly intimate profile of the deeply loved and very colourful artist. Ms Hedgcock said Meg's tour and shared experiences would bring a new perspective of MOAC, which faithfully re-creates the famous rooms of Olley's Sydney home.

"More than 300,000 people have visited the home studio re-creation and enjoyed its intriguing aesthetic since MOAC was officially opening in March 2014," Ms Hedgcock said.

"Meg's talk will bring even more life to those rooms, the fascinating items that fill them, the artist who painted them and the equally interesting people Olley hosted at her home."

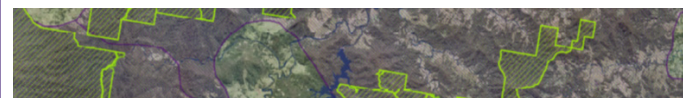
